Brigadoon was First Performed at the Ziegfeld Theatre, New York, March 13, 1947

Director's Notes....

There is a river in southwest Scotland that flows 30 miles through Loch Doon to the Firth of Clyde south of Ayr. The river Doon flows through the town of Alloway on its way to the firth and near Alloway, still standing today, is a 13th century stone bridge. This bridge, the brig o'Doon, is

immortalized by Scottish poet Robert Burns in his poem "Tam O'Shanter". Burns was born in Alloway in 1759.

In the 1700's Scotland was at the end of centuries of persecution of witches. "Tam O'Shanter" is a mythical tale about local witches and the haunted local church. Late one evening Tam is returning home from a heavy drinking session in Ayr and while passing the haunted Kirk (or church) he disturbs a coven of witches. Tam flees over the 13th Century Brig o' Doon across running water and to safety (local belief held that witches can't cross bodies of water).



With the witches on his heels, Tam barely makes it as the grasping witches pull the tail from his horse as he crosses the bridge.

And it's in this time that our mythical town of Brigadoon is set. Hidden from witches and the outside world by a magical mist, Brigadoon only appears one day every hundred years. Our story takes place in the 20th Century, only two days after Brigadoon chose to hide from the witches. At heart, *Brigadoon* is a love story, a romance. That's the story I'm personally attracted to, the reason I chose to direct this piece. It's the story of the search for true love that permeates so many of our lives. Boy and girl meet, fall in love and face obstacles to their being together, in this case the girl and her town will disappear into the mist at the break of dawn, leaving the boy alone in his own world. However, when ye love someone deeply anything is possible.

Larry Dennis, Director

Larry has been directing in Boise's community theaters for 20 years. He has directed over 40 shows for various theaters, including *Beauty and the Beast*, which he co-directed with Wendy Koeppl, and *Wizard of Oz* for Boise Music Week. In the past he has served on the Board of Directors for Alley Repertory Theater, Boise Little Theater, Stage Coach Theatre and the Idaho Shakespeare Festival Guild. He received his theater training at the University of Idaho.

Boise Music Week — Historical Highlights

Eugene A. Farner, director of musical activities at St. Michael's Episcopal Cathedral and St. Margaret's School (now Boise State University), and director of the Boise Civic Festival Chorus, returned to Boise after serving in the United States Army in World War I. Together with members of the chorus and leaders of the community, he initiated Boise Music Week in May 1919. His vision for Boise Music Week was (1) to provide for local performers to contribute their talents to the community and (2) to provide an annual event conducted entirely free of commercial profit. While other cities in the United States established local music weeks at about the same time, Boise's remained unique because of its local focus and admission-free programs.

In the 1920s through World War II, Boise Music Week events occurred on a large wooden platform constructed in front of the Idaho Statehouse. The performers during those years — the Festival Chorus, the Boise Municipal Band, local organists, the Boise Tuesday Musical Club, school choirs, and church choirs — were the precursors to today's *School Night*, *Church Night*, *Showcase*, and *Noontime Organ Recital* events. The outdoor venue was abandoned when War restrictions on the use of lumber forced performers indoors, but returned in the mid-1970s when Boise Music Week initiated *Music in the Park* at the Julia Davis (now Gene Harris) Bandshell.

Drama presentations and pageants were also important during the early years of Boise Music Week. Pageants depicting events of early American history and European culture, complete with lavish sets and colorful costumes, were performed on the wooden platform and later moved indoors. Expanding the tradition of local pageantry, Boise Music Week produced its first Broadway play in 1959. The musical, *Oklahoma!*, was an instant hit with local audiences. Local high schools housed the productions until 1988, when Velma Morrison and the Harry W. Morrison Foundation invited Boise Music Week to perform at the Velma V. Morrison Center for the Performing Arts. The musicals staged there continue to draw Boise Music Week's largest crowds.

Even though Boise today is considered a point of destination for world-renowned performers, Boise Music Week, with its focus on providing opportunities for local performers to

participate in the culture of their community, at no charge to the community, remains as unique and relevant a cultural force now, in its 90th year, as it was in 1919.

Dr. John Baldwin is Professor of Percussion and Music Theory at Boise State University. He serves as timpanist and principal percussionist with the Boise Philharmonic, and is principal percussionist with the Treasure Valley Concert Band. Vocal Director – Linda Eustice Berg

After 20 years in the Meridian School district, Linda is in her fifth year as an elementary music specialist in the Boise School District, teaching at Whittier and Owyhee Harbor, and as the director of the Boise All City Honor Choir. Mrs. Berg was the vocal director for the BMW productions of Guys and Dolls, Oliver, Annie Get Your Gun, The Wizard of Oz and Beauty and the Beast. She has sung extensively with Opera Idaho and was the founder and

Choreographer – Kathy Lee



Kathy owned and operated a Boise dance studio for 24 years, offering tap, jazz and ballet to all ages. Bishop Kelly High School asked her to help choreograph *Fiddler on the Roof* in the midseventies, and she had found her hobby! Kathy has enjoyed being involved with high school productions, Boise Little Theater, Stage Coach Theater, Knock 'Em Dead Theatre, the first two Humanitarian Bowl Games and other musical productions throughout the community. *Brigadoon* is Kathy's 11th Music Week production, and she has greatly enjoyed the opportunity to work with the production crew and the cast! Assistant Director/Stage Manager – Diane Clayton

She was on stage in *My Fair Lady* when the Morrison Center opened in 1984. Brigadoon is her 26th show for Boise Music Week, her 16th time as AD and her 11th time as Stage Manager. Producer/Photographer – Lee Downum


involving period costumes.

Michael has been featured in numerous Performing Arts Series, has performed at Gloucester Cathedral, England, and attended the Oundle International Festival in England where he was invited to perform a work ,commissioned by the Royal College of Organists, to launch an album of contemporary English organ music. Michael has also performed in England's Wells, Portsmouth, Truro, and Canterbury Cathedrals. He presently is the Director of Music and Organist at St. Michael's Episcopal Cathedral, in Boise, where he oversees the Music program including the Cathedral Choir, Treble Choir, Cherub Choir, and the *Music at St. Michael's* concert series.




JIM PERKINS, COCHAIRPERSON

BMW'S INTERPRETERS TO THE DEAF

Once again, BMW's interpreters will be telling the story of our Broadway Production.
This is their 18th Boise Music Week production to be interpreted for the deaf. They are interpreting Friday night and at both Saturday performances. You might see them down front and to the right. Deaf attendance has been between 20 and 50. In addition to the deaf, other

interpreters, sign language students, and family members of the deaf are also seated in the deaf section. Once the interpreters are provided a copy of the script, they meet to divide the script into teams, usually a team of two. Each team decides who signs for which characters. They practice with their partners and attend rehearsals throughout the month of April. Their biggest challenge is signing puns (they don't make sense in sign language), and signing songs with nonsensical words, like "Oompah-pah" (Oliver), and "Shipoopi" (The Music Man). This year's challenge is the cast's Scottish brogue!
