Hello, Dolly!

A Musical Play in Two Acts

Book by Michael Stewart, based on the play *The Matchmaker* by Thornton Wilder Lyrics and Music by Jerry Herman

Hello, Dolly! was first produced on Broadway in 1964

Hello, Dolly! has its origins in an 1835 one-act farce by John Oxenford called A Day Well Spent, which was then extended into a full-length play entitled He Will Go on a Spree, by Johann Nestroy in 1842. Thornton Wilder adapted Nestroy's version into an Americanized comedy called *The Merchant of Yonkers* which opened on Broadway in 1938. In 1955, Wilder rewrote the play and expanded a previously minor character into the lead role of Dolly Gallagher Levi, and renamed it The Matchmaker. Michael Stewart and Jerry Herman then added songs and dance numbers to create Hello, Dolly!

The play takes place in the 1890s and is the story of Mrs. Dolly Levi's efforts to marry Horace Vandergelder, the well-known half-a-millionaire, and send his money circulating among the people like rainwater the way her late husband, Ephraim Levi, taught her. But she needs a sign from Ephraim that he approves. As she waits for this sign from above, Mrs. Levi tracks Vandergelder to his mercantile store in Yonkers, then by train to Mrs. Molloy's hat shop in New York, out into the streets of the city where they are all caught up in the Fourteenth Street Association Parade, and finally to the most elegant and expensive restaurant in town, the Harmonia Gardens. She never misses a chance to meddle along the way.

Wilder created a collage of characters and characteristics that are timeless. The cantankerous curmudgeon, the brass and bossy leading lady, the naïve ingénue, the bumbling employee, clever assistant and the young lovers remind us of characters we have seen before. We all recognize these characters from plays we've seen, books we've read or people we know. We can all relate, in some way, to each character's situations, struggles and emotions. We are drawn to the things that remind us of important moments in our lives. Hello, Dolly! is a celebration of those moments. It is a celebration of hope, of life, and of love.



Yonkers: City in New York, bordering the Bronx, and founded in 1646. Located on the Hudson River, and home of the inventors of the safety elevator, the FM radio, and the elevated train. Today it is New York's 4th largest city.

<u>Sheep Dip</u>: A mix of insecticides and fungicides, invented in 1830, used to protect sheep from infestation.

<u>Bluing</u>: a household product added to the final rinse in laundry, to make white clothes whiter. Mrs. Stewart's Bluing, first sold in 1883, is still available today.

Hack: a coach or carriage kept for hire; a taxi.

The Astor family was the wealthiest family in the United States in the late 19th century due to prominent ties in politics, business and society. The most famous of the family was John Jacob Astor, the first multi-millionaire in America through fur trading, real estate and opium.

<u>Tony Pastor</u>: American impresario (1837-1908) – a variety performer and theater owner. One of the founding forces of vaudeville.

<u>Delmonico's</u> Restaurant is considered to be one of the first American fine dining establishments and is the home of such dishes as Lobster Newburg and Baked Alaska. Originally opened in 1825 by Giovanni and Pietro Delmonico, it reopened in 1891 as an 8-story restaurant adorned with marble columns from Pompei. Chef Emeril Lagasse currently owns the establishment.

<u>P.T.Barnum's Museum</u>: Opened in 1841, was twice destroyed by fire and rebuilt. For a twenty-five cent admission, visitors viewed an ever-revolving series of "attractions," from the patchwork Fejee Mermaid to the diminutive and articulate Tom Thumb.

<u>Greenback:</u> A nickname originally applied specifically to the 19th century Demand Note dollars created by Abraham Lincoln to finance the costs of the Civil War for the North. The original note was printed in black and green on the back.

<u>Jenny Lind</u>: was a Swedish opera singer, often known as the "Swedish Nightingale." One of the best singers of the 19th century, she is known for her performances in Sweden, Europe and for an extraordinarily popular concert tour of America beginning in 1850.

<u>Vamp</u>: a woman who unscrupulously exploits, ruins, or degrades the men she seduces, or an actress noted for her roles as an unscrupulous seductress


Vocal Director - Linda Eustice Berg

University this fall. Thank you, Mom and Dad, for always believing in me. I Love you!





For the past several years, the School Night concert for Music Week has been in the BSU Taco Bell Arena. because of a depressed economy that is hitting the public schools, this year we will be doing the concert at Capital High School gymnasium. This change of venue will help us save several thousand dollars and still have a great concert featuring our talented students. This gym is the largest in the district and can hold up to 3,500 or more depending on what seats are used. We will be cutting down the amount of performing groups from eleven to seven to help control the size of the audience.

The Public School Night Gala Concert, to be held on Friday, April 30th, 2010 at 7:30p.m., is a highlight of the musical year for the community and for school performers. Performances in this year's concert will include selections by the Kiwanis Choir, the All-City Intermediate Honor Band, the All-City Elementary Honor Choir, and the All-City Elementary Honor Orchestra. Also included will be the United Junior High School Chorus, "Capital Singers" Choir, and the Junior High Honor Orchestra. The 2010 concert will end with the mass choirs and junior high orchestra performing *God Bless America* and will be under the direction of Roger Lingle, Coordinator of Creative and Performing Arts of Boise Public Schools. The schools of Boise pledge their continued dedication to the art of music and the inclusion of music education as an essential component of life-long learning for all students.
